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A Community Asset—This Place Matters!



This place, our Lakewood Masonic Temple, matters! Not only does it matter to our Lakewood Masonic Family, it matters to the Lakewood community.

We know that our Masonic home is an important community asset because we hear it from City

and community leaders. The photograph at the left, taken from the National Trust for Historic Preservation's web site (www.preservationnation.org/), is physical evidence of our community's esteem.

The National Trust initiated a program called This Place Matters by which members can make online submissions of photographs and stories of special places that matter to them. Last May, during Historic Preservation Month, the Lakewood City Council, with the support of the City administration and various City boards, unanimously adopted an historic preservation ordinance allowing the local designation of historic and architecturally significant residential and commercial properties and districts. The City hopes that local designations will lead to more listings on the National Register of Historic Places. Lakewood currently has two National Register historic districts.

To commemorate the passage of the ordinance, Heather Rudge, a member of the City's Heritage Advisory Board, submitted a story to the National Trust's This Place Matters web site, using the picture to the left as a prime example of a property that matters to the community and that is eligible for listing. (An enlargement would reveal that each person holds a sign stating "This Place Matters.")

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Our New Masonic Scholarship

Main Street Lakewood

Main Street Lakewood is a volunteer-based program operating under the aegis of Lakewood Community Progress, Inc. (LCPI), an economic development corporation founded in 2002 by the Lakewood Chamber of Commerce and the City of Lakewood. LCPI's mission is to improve the quality of life of Lakewood residents by creating alliances with community leaders, leveraging community assets and expanding the pool of community resources to facilitate economic stability and growth. It is a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization, the same status as our Lakewood Masonic Foundation.

Main Street Lakewood (MSL) (www.mainstreetlakewood.org) is dedicated to the revitalization of Lakewood's historic downtown commercial district (between Arthur Avenue and Bunts Road). Our Lakewood Masonic Temple is a major western anchor. MSL's purpose is to facilitate investment in downtown Lakewood by working to create an environment where residents, employees and guests want to come to live, work, shop and play.

Over the past year our Lakewood Masonic Temple has partnered with MSL in two of its major promotions—Light Up Lakewood, an event to kick off the holiday season; and Walk+Roll Lakewood, a summer event promoting healthy pursuits such as walking and bicycle riding. Detroit Avenue was closed to vehicles for both events. As with the annual Lakewood Arts Festival, our facility serves as a welcome rest area and performance venue linking us with visitors who may become future renters or members.

Dove

In ancient symbolism, the *dove* represented purity and innocence; in ecclesiology, especially in church decoration, it is a symbol of the Holy Spirit. In Freemasonry, the dove is only viewed in reference to its use by Noah as a messenger. Hence, in the Grand Lodge of England, doves are the jewels of the Deacons, because these officers are the messengers of the Masters and Wardens. They are not so used in America. In an honorary or side Degree formerly conferred in America, and called the *Ark and Dove*, that bird is a prominent symbol.

High Priest's Message

Companions:

The stories inculcated in the degrees at Cunningham Chapter are as refreshing as they are informative. The degrees, while still centered on the Temple of Solomon and the Ark of the Covenant, help us learn more about the symbolic Lodge. The lessons help explain what happened when the Temple of Solomon was finished and furnished, and what preparations were made for the Ark of the Covenant if the temple were to be destroyed.

If we could put the degrees in some type of chronological order, then we would start with the Entered Apprentice, followed by the Fellow Craft, the Mark Master, the Master Mason, the Most Excellent Master, the Past Master, and the Royal Arch Mason. The other degrees in the York Rite of Masonry fill in between and after the Royal Arch degree.

The Mark Master teaches the nobility of labor. The Past Master degree teaches moderation and decorum. In the Most Excellent Master the Mason sees, for the first time, the completed temple. The lessons of the Royal Arch degree are the essence of Masonic truth.

Cunningham's Inspection will be in the Mark Master degree. The Temple of Solomon, in the Mark Master, is still in the building phase. This is a fun degree where the candidate is one of the craftsmen. Here we learn of the nobility of labor for the building of our spiritual temple, which is eternal in the heavens.

Wars on Barbary Pirates

The regiments which fought across North Africa in World War II were not the first Americans to fight in Tunis, Algeria, Morocco, for in 1801 we sent our then infant navy there to make war on the pirates of the Barbary Coast, who had been destroying shipping for many years, American included, and France and Britain together had not been able to stop them. If we succeeded where the latter had failed it was largely owing to the ingenuity of one man, William Eaton, Consul at Tunis, who from out of Egypt and with a small group of natives infiltrated from behind the coast. It was Eaton who sent home the famous message: "Send some cash and a few marines." The Marine Corps was born in that war.

The majority of heroes and leaders in the war, which was neither short nor easy, were Masons: Stephen Decatur, William Bainbridge (probably), Commodore Edward Preble, Commodore Isaac Chauncey, Commodore Thomas MacDonough, etc. Decatur's utterance, quoted countless times, did not say that his country was never wrong or that he would support it in wrongdoing; he said, "My country—may it ever be right, but, right or wrong, my country;"—the utterance plainly saying that his country might be in the wrong. Like his father before him, who had belonged to Veritas Lodge, No. 16, Maryland, Decatur became a Mason early, in St. John's Lodge, Newport, R. I., in 1799. William Eaton was raised in North Star Lodge, Manchester, Vermont, in 1792.

University Lodges

A university Lodge is any regular Lodge "on the campus" of a college or university, and designed to serve the needs of faculty and students. In American such a Lodge has no special membership provisions in its charter, but it may carry them in its by-laws. The Lodge lists published in Grand Lodge Proceedings are so completely non-descriptive that from them it is impossible to learn how many university Lodges there are in the United States, but there the number is not small.

In England where the Craft has always maintained a closer liaison with colleges and with scholarship the number is large relative to the number of schools. A University Lodge was constituted in London, in 1730. No. 293 was constituted at Cambridge University in 1763. The Lodge of Alfred, No. 455, was formed at Oxford University, in 1769; it was succeeded by the Apollo University Lodge, No. 357, in 1818. Isaac Newton University Lodge was formed at Cambridge, 1861; the Alma Mater, No. 1492, at Cambridge, in 1874; University Lodge at Sheffield, in 1919; Achilles, No. 4078, at Newcastle, in 1920; University Lodge at Liverpool, in 1921; Imperial College Lodge, London, in 1923; Universities Lodge, Cardiff, Wales, in 1934; at Birmingham, in 1936; the University of Manchester Lodge, in 1937. . . .

Commander's Message

Greetings, Sir Knights:

The Annual Inspection of a Knight Templar Commandery in the State of Ohio consists of two parts: The Order of the Temple and The Full Form Opening.

The Commandery Orders gather the most meaningful lessons of the three York Rite Bodies, namely Lodge, Chapter and Council and apply them to the Christian way of life. The Order of the Red Cross and the Order of Malta lay the ground work for the Order of the Temple, one of the most impressive and powerful ritualistic portrayals in all of Masonry.

While many a Knight Templar puts his best foot forward for the ritual work of the Order of the Temple, many do not understand the significance of the Full Form Opening as part of the Annual Inspection. The Full Form Opening is much more than a fancy way to do introductions.

While you can't take away the fact that introductions of visiting Sir Knights and Grand Commandery Officers is important, there are many other aspects of the opening that are more important. "Pulling off" the Opening with all one's own people is a major accomplishment in itself.

The Full Form Opening consists of Forming Ranks and escorts to perform the Reception of the Inspector and Grand Commander, if present. It is noteworthy to point out that for the past four years we have had the pleasure of having the Grand Commander at our Annual Inspection.

Once everyone has been escorted into the Asylum, introduced and seated then the Eminent Commander gives the orders to form lines and demonstrate the passing of the major passwords and other significant signs. The next action is the "Sword Manual" when the Sir Knights demonstrate their ability to follow commands and handle their swords in a proper manner. Following the Sword Manual, the ability to march in formation, present the colors and again follow commands in a precision manner is demonstrated. Finally, the Rehearsal of Duties is performed, and each officer must explain his duties and his proper position in the asylum.

When performed well the Full Form Opening is as impressive as the Order of the Temple. This year our Eminent Commander would like to perform the Full Form Opening at each of our stated meetings. When our Annual Inspection rolls around we will be very comfortable with the "Opening" and should make quite an impression on the Inspecting Officer.

President's Message

Cleveland Assembly will soon be turning 88 years old. Cleveland Assembly #15 S.O.O.B. was constituted on April 29, 1921. The first meeting was held at the Odd Fellows Hall located at 2064 East 55th Street. By October 1921 the Assembly membership had grown; and the Assembly moved to Python Castle located at 1626 East 55th Street, giving them a more suitable facility.

In 1922 it was voted to rent the Lodge room on the third floor at the Al Koran Club located at 1624 East 35th Street. The "New Masonic Temple" opened, and in November 1923 the Assembly moved to 3615 Euclid Avenue (The Valley of Cleveland Scottish Rite Building). This remained its home until moving to Lakewood Masonic Temple in 1999.

On April 15, 1950, Lorain Assembly #147 was constituted. On February 5, 1982, it consolidated with Cleveland Assembly.

During these yearly years our members did a lot of welfare work such as inviting children from the Christian orphanage to Christmas parties and presenting them with gifts. We continue today with charitable work. The Knights Templar Eye Foundation has been supported by the Social Order of the Beauceant since 1957, and since this time the S.O.O.B. has made donations of over one and half million dollars.

Today's Beauceant is an Order with a long history of support to the Commandery, one that has proven to be a source of pleasure and benefit both to us and to the Sir Knights. It is a history we are proud of and one we wish to maintain. The S.O.O.B is open to the wives, widows, mothers, sisters, and daughters of Knights Templar who are 18 years and older.

Notwithstanding that all the modern American Masonic Manuals and Masters Carpets from the time of Jeremy L. Cross exhibit the picture of a *heart* among the emblems of the Third Degree, there is no such symbol in the instructions except as a part of the stern injunction that justice will sooner or later overtake the wrongdoer. But the theory that every many who becomes a Freemason must first be prepared in his heart was advanced among the earliest lectures of the eighteenth century, and demonstrates, as Krause properly remarks, in Speculative Freemasonry, an internal principle which addresses itself not simply to the outward conduct, but to the inner spirit and conscience of all men who seek its instructions.
